UOL Webinars - Submitted by Marianne Carmack

The need to stay in touch and reach out to one another—underscored by a passionate desire to learn, grow in faith and love, and to develop spiritually combined to bring together many members of the UOL. To respond to this need, a series of three seminars and two Annual Lenten Retreats were scheduled for 2020-2021, focusing on Liturgy, prayer, and the practical applications of our Orthodox Faith. Thus far three seminars were held, hosting almost 100 participants from all across the US and from other Archdioceses, as well. Those that registered attended at least one or two retreats, and many, all three. The seminars have indeed accomplished many of the goals of the UOL's Education Commission and have been extraordinarily well received by the faithful.



The retreats were facilitated by Father John Charest, Pastor of SS. Peter and Paul in Carnegie, PA and Spiritual Advisor to the Junior Ukrainian Orthodox League, and Fr. Ivan Tchopko, Pastor of SS. Peter and Paul in Youngstown, Ohio, and Chaplain of St. Thomas Chapel at All Saints Camp. Our president Karen Ferraro, was there to welcome us, to encourage our participation, and to reinforce the presence and continuity of the UOL by providing updates and previews of things to come as well as words of encouragement as we confront the challenges of the Pandemic, while Daria Pishko Komichak handled the difficult job of facilitating questions and answers and smoothing out technical difficulties and glitches.

We were blessed, along with Fr. Ivan and Fr. Charest, with four extraordinary speakers. On Friday, September 24, 2020, The Very Rev. Fr. Athanasios Haros, Dean of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Cathedral, Tarpon Springs, FL discussed the New Liturgical Year, reviewing the prayers offered at the beginning of the new liturgical cycle of feasts. And then, gave an inspired view of the revelation—through the fixed and movable feasts and church seasons and fasts—of our salvation. Additional materials relating to the topic are posted on the UOL of USA website.

The next seminar, held on Friday, December 11, 2020, visited the themes of "The Nativity." Victoria Swindle, studying at the University of Pittsburgh, provided an excellent resource that included recommendations of computer apps, books, and internet resources. Victoria shared her own experience in using these resources and how they have enriched her experience. Aides, not only to celebrate The Nativity, but also many other topics as we journey in the Orthodox faith.



Father Silouan Rolando brilliantly led us through a discussion of the Nativity of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, one of the most joyful days in the Orthodox Church ranking next to the Resurrection of Jesus. He gave us new insights that lead to a more complete understanding of why we fast, the hymnography of the church, and how the Nativity foreshadows His Passion and Resurrection.


Our third seminar was presented on January 30, 2020. Not since World War II has the Church faced a crisis with the magnitude of COVID-19. Our third seminar—Stewardship in Times of Crisis explored giving and generosity and our agility in managing this crisis. Is it just a matter of money? How has your Church turned crisis into opportunity? What can we learn from our experience? What are ways we can secure the future? were explored by Fr. Robert C. Holet, Ph.D. Fr. Holet's presentation is posted on the UOL of USA website. Father Holet left us with questions to help guide as we continue to work through matters of faith and transformation during this trying time. We encourage you to take a moment and review its content. Fr. John Charest discussed selected results from the Stewardship in times of Crisis Survey that was sent out prior to the seminar.

These results will also be posted on the website, but here are a few excerpts warming the heart and giving hope. These quotes are taken from the responses to the question How has your Orthodox Faith sustained you:

"The TRUE FOCUS of Jesus Christ and God has come more into perspective. Almost nothing else matters in life except our complete dependence of God and Christ. I have truly begun to realize what is most important in life and a lot of other things really do not matter to me any longer."

"Especially in the first few weeks, when everyone was suddenly faced with their mortality, and panic was the primary characteristic of the pandemic, being able to attend Morning, Evening, and Sunday services via mobile devices through the UOC of USA (and Seminary), Facebook pages was pivotal in retaining sanity, hope in God, and even though isolated - retaining familial ties with our brothers/sisters in Christ."

Ukrainian Cultural Corner

As Orthodox Christians, we are very familiar with Meatfare and Cheesefare Sundays. First, we give up meat products and then dairy products for the duration of Great Lent. For as long as I remember, my family had the tradition of attending Divine Liturgy on Cheesefare Sunday. After Liturgy, we would go to others and ask for forgiveness then exchange three kisses or a warm embrace. This was a gesture of reconciliation. An effort to cleanse



yourself of ill feelings and prepare yourself for spiritual renewal. I always thought this was a Christian tradition. Though this time of renewal and celebration predates Christianity in Ukraine.

Masnitsya is an age-old Slavic celebration marking the coming of spring. Some archeologists have gone so far as to say it is the oldest Slavic celebration still observed. For Ukrainians, Masnitsya meant making cheese varenyky or mlintsi (crepes). Some Ukrainians will argue that the traditional making of mlintsi was a Russian influence since their tradition is to make blini. Either way, the cheese varenyky represented the moon and mlintsi represented the shape of the sun. This is quite fitting since the first day of spring is also referred to as the vernal equinox, a time when the time of day and night are equal.

In its fullest form, Masnitsya was a weeklong celebration. Monday was called 'the Meeting' or 'Zustrich.' Women would gather and make a doll out of straw. This doll was placed prominently on the dinner table where it would be among guests that visited throughout the week. Tuesday was "Playful/



Flirtatious games" or 'Zahravanya.' This day would include sledding or snow-ball fights. Wednesday was known as 'Sweet Day' or 'Solodky denj. Women would gather and cook up a feast. Thursday was a day of Loud Celebrations or 'Rozhuliaj.' Men and women would participate in outdoor activities. Friday was 'Mother-in-law' day or 'Teshchyni Vechirky.' This was a day to be with your family. From this day comes a phrase, 'to your mother-in-law's for crepes.' On Saturday, young women gathered to strengthen their relationships or newly engaged women would invite their families over. This was refered to as 'Sister-in-law Day' or 'Posydenky Zovytsi.' The last day of Masnitsya is Farewell Sunday or Forgiveness Sunday. Ukrainians would ask forgiveness of others for reconciliation as we see today on Forgiveness Sunday. This gesture was a way of ensuring growth of the family. On this day, you would also burn the straw doll and use the ashes as fertilizer for the soil.

And, of course, we have our Senior Chapter Achievement Award that is voted on by the National Executive Board based on the annual chapter reports submitted.

Junior UOL Awards include the Lynn Sawchuk-Sharon Kuzbyt Memorial Scholarship (LSSK) and the Very Reverend Volodymyr Bukata Award, considered the Junior "Orthodox of the Year." Some awards require letters and other documentation, so please don't wait until the last minute. Encourage our youth to apply!

In May, the UOL joins with the rest of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA in commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the repose of +Metropolitan John. If you have any photos of the late Metropolitan, please send them to me at **president@uolofusa.org** along with any stories related to the photos. This would be a perfect time to honor his memory by taking a collection at your parish for the Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund, perhaps on or around Pascha, as the anniversary of his passing is May 3rd.

Finally, the Philadelphia Convention Committee and UOL National Executive Board are actively working to determine whether we'll be able to have an "in person" National Convention this year, as planned in the Philadelphia area, July 21-25, 2021. A decision will be made in mid-April. Can't wait until we can be together!

Very Rev. Volodymyr Bukata Award

This award was first established as the Junior Orthodox of the Year Award. In 1966, the name was officially changed as a tribute to the late Father Bukata for his dedication to the Ukrainian Orthodox League.

Father Bukata was the first spiritual advisor of the League, part of the Organizational Committee at the 7th Sobor in Philadelphia, PA and translator of our prayer book into English.

Father Volodymyr also wrote "The Orthodox Faith," the League's first publication. Fr. Bukata also edited the Youth Life supplement of the Dnipro



which became the Bulletin we know today. Fr. Bukata and Olga served the Passaic, NJ Parish, and later the Newark Parish which ultimately today is based in Maplewood, NJ.

In some villages, Masnitsya is referred to as Kolodka. This is because a

smaller celebration, Kolodka, was added as part of the larger Masnitsya celebration. The coming of spring meant a rebirth and the creation of new families through marriage. Kolodka was a celebration to the pagan goddess of marriage, Koloda. During this festival, women would search for unwed males and tie a kolodka onto their arm or leg. A kolodka was a small



branch (a symbol of the tree of life) that was decorated with strings or flowers. The 'tying of the kolodka' was a symbolic punishment for missing the opportunity to wed, an opportunity to grow the family tree. (For Christians this meant waiting until after Pascha.) The kolodka could only be removed through bribes like alcohol, jewelry, or money. If in fact a match was made, this kolodka would be replaced with a kerchief and/or a pysanka from the beloved.

The observance of Masnitsya was stopped completely during the times of the Soviet Union unfortunately. Though the intrigue of the people remained and thus we see a resurfacing and often times a rebranding of such traditions.

Masnitsya may not be an observance your family can feasibly continue. Though I do find that younger generations desire to at least know about these traditions. So in an effort to preserve a little piece of what was done in the past, I'll leave you with this: a recipe for cheese pierogies and a recipe for crepes.

Mlintsi -Crepes

3/4 cup flour 3 eggs 3/4 flour 2-3 T. sugar

2 tsp. oil or 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ T. melted butter

Whisk eggs in bowl. Add milk slowly. Whisk melted butter into egg and milk mixture. Sift flour, sugar, and salt. Heat an 8 in. fry-



ing pan on medium heat (do not overheat). Add about ½ cup of batter and turn frying pan to allow the batter to create a thin layer on the bottom of the pan. When the edges are golden brown and start to pull up, carefully flip the crepe and cook the other side.

Cheese Varenyky

Dough:

1 ½ lbs. flour 1 c. milk
½ stick butter 3 eggs
2 T. sugar Salt to



Sift flour. Add milk and butter. Stir

well. Combine with eggs, salt, and sugar. Mix well. Roll out thinly, cut dough into circles with a biscuit cutter. Set aside.

taste

Cheese filling:

2 lbs. Farmer's cheese
½ c. sugar
¼ tsp. vanilla, if desired
2 eggs
½ stick butter
Salt to taste

Mix cheese, sugar, and salt. Stir well. Add whipped eggs and mix again.

Place a small ball of cheese in the middle of the dough disk. Fold over and pinch edges. Cook varenyky in boiling water for 8 -10 minutes or until they float.

Serve with melted butter, browned onions, or sour cream. Enjoy!

2021 Essay Contest Topics

Category A/Kindergarten: The Prokimen in the 3rd Tone says "Sing praises to our God, sing praises! Sing praises to our King, sing praises!" Draw a picture of your church choir singing praises to our God.

Category B/Grades 1 and 2: At the end of Liturgy the priest says a prayer that includes: "For every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from Thee, the Father of Lights..." Draw a picture and write 2 to 5 sentences showing and telling us, what good gifts you have received from God.

Category C/Grades 3 and 4: In the Lord's Prayer we say: "...and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us..." Write 50 to 100 words on why it is so important that we forgive those that trespass against us.

Category D/Grades 5 and 6: The First Antiphon, as sung on the major Feast Days of our Church, includes the refrain: "Through the prayer of the Birth-Giver of God, O Savior save us." Why do you think it is important for us to pray to Theotokos to ask Her to pray for us? Write 125 or more words explaining your answer.

Category E/Grades 7 and 8: During the Great Litany, the Priest or Deacon prays for "Our God-loving and God-protected Country, United States of America, for the government and for the Armed Forces and for our God-loving and God-protected homeland Ukraine." Write 150 or more explaining why it is important to do this and pray for the country.

Category F/Grades 9 and 10: During the Great Litany, the Priest or Deacon prays, "For our deliverance from all affliction, wrath, danger and necessity, let us pray to the Lord." Write 200 words or more on what this means to you.


Another event that we needed to cancel was our Chapter caroling and visiting

The beads are said to come from a plant that sprouted at the Cross during the crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ. The plant sprang from the tears of the Mother of God. A story is told that a monk struggled making a prayer rope and the Theotokos appeared to him as he was crying in desperation that he could not master the prayer rope. She placed these seeds into his hand so that he could create a prayer bracelet.

The seeds of this plant naturally have an area that can be tied together.

The bracelet is beautifully packaged in an organza purse with a brief description of this story and how to use a prayer bracelet. All bracelets are made for adults (approximately 8 inches – with a slight variation based on the size of the seeds).



LSSK Scholarship Submitted by Anna Anderson

If you have a high school senior, or know of one in your parish, then it is time to encourage them to apply for the LSSK scholarship. In 1975, at the 28th Annual UOL Convention, the LSSK scholarship was established in the memory of two lovely, dynamic ladies; Lynn Sawchuk and Sharon Kuzbyt. Their untimely deaths left an indelible mark on the life of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church and the Ukrainian Orthodox League.

Each year, the LSSK scholarship is awarded to eligible applicants that must be high school seniors or within 5 years of high school graduation and be enrolled in higher education. Criteria includes: excellent academics, being a current or former member, in the case of a college applicant, of the Junior Orthodox League; have a record of outstanding performance in the service of their church and of the League; involvement in extra-curricular activities; and be of high moral and ethical character.

- 1. Applications must be submitted by **certified mail (preferred) or email.**
- 2. Each recommendation form must be submitted in a separate envelope that is sealed by the recommender and signed across the seal of the envelope or be emailed directly to the LSSK chair at the NEB email for Second-Vice Presi-
- 3. The recommender's sealed envelope should be returned to the applicant to be submitted with all the other recommenders.
- 4. Recommenders include: Jr. UOL advisor; Jr. UOL president or Vice-President; Parish priest; and Guidance Counselor, principal or teacher.
- 5. An official transcript must be submitted.
- 6. All proper signatures must appear on the application.
- 7. The applicant gathers all the above and submits it in one envelope that is then sent by certified mail (preferred method) and must arrive by the May 31st deadline to be considered.
- 8. Applications are available online at UOL of the USA. On the homepage, scroll down to resources and click on scholarships and recognition; scroll to Jr. UOL Awards and you will find where to click for the application form.9. Applications are to be sent to:
