UOL Presence at the 23rd Regular Sobor of the UOC of USA Submitted by Karen Ferraro

A report of UOL activity since the last regular Sobor in October 2019 was submitted and included in the reports given to all Sobor attendees. Highlights included:

- UOL adaptation to the lack of face-to-face interactions beginning in March 2020 with virtual educational webinars, virtual meetings, reaching out to Chapter presidents to discuss challenges, restructuring of fundraisers, such as Souper Bowl Sunday, serving our community in hard times, and hosting virtual annual UOL conventions.
- Highlights of our 73rd, 74th, and 75th UOL Conventions.
- Did you know we have donated over \$125,000 over the years to St. Andrew's Ukrainian Orthodox Society via our Souper Bowl Sunday Fundraiser?
- The UOL awarded Metropolitan John Scholarships totaling \$19,485 between 2020 and 2022.
- Our Education Commission held virtual and in-person retreats, hosted four webinars, continued the Praying Our Way projects, and hosted the annual UOL Essay Contest.
- Although St. Thomas Weekend was cancelled for 2020 and 2021, the UOL returned to handling parking at the event in 2022.
- The UOL donated \$9,500 to summer encampments at All Saints Camp and \$6,700 towards our pledge of \$25,000 for the All Saints Camp Capital Campaign.
- Our UOL Bulletin was published 5 or 6 times each year and we maintained our online and social media presence.
- The UOL awarded over \$7,850 in LSSK scholarships.

The report concluded by honoring all of YOU, as follows:

UOL members are the backbone of our UOC of USA parishes. They sing in our choirs, they serve on our parish boards, they teach in our church schools, they run our Sisterhoods, and today, they are leaders in supporting Ukraine with humanitarian aid and assistance to local refugees. In spite of being kept busy with a full load of work and family commitments, it is important to them to make the time to participate in the activities of our National UOL and help their own parishes at the chapter level. Being in the UOL is an opportunity to interact with members of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA from other cities, learn what they are putting into action in their parishes, and foster life-long friendships. Won't you join us in our mission? With minimal time, much can be accomplished! (Go, team UOL!)

Sr. UOL President, PM Laryssa Charest, was unable to attend the Sobor, so Immediate Past President Karen Ferraro presented the speech she prepared, which touched on our plans in this new UOL year.

Those who attended our convention in July may recall that Dr. Rebecca Druash volunteered to be the UOL delegate to the Sobor. At the Sobor, Rebecca was elected to the new Council of the Metropolia, along with Karen Ferraro. Also newly elected to the Council is UOL member Victoria Swindle. The current Sr. UOL President also traditionally serves on the Council of the Metropolia, as the head of an organization of the UOC of USA.

Developing Fellowship Across our UOC Parishes Submitted by Natalie Bilynsky

At the 75th UOL Convention there was discussion about developing a strategic plan for the UOL and ways to enhance the organization. The UOL was built upon a structure where chapters are integral in the organization of the UOL. Within the structure of chapters the UOL has been able to accomplish much and will continue to do so.

As we review the list of approximately 90 parishes in the UOC of USA, there are multiple parishes with a limited number of faithful and limited resources. For many faithful, the chapter structure is particularly difficult and having another organization within the parish is not feasible. At the UOL Convention there was initial discussion about alternatives to support individuals where the chapter structure is more difficult because of where they live or the size of their parish. If forming a chapter is not possible, we want to be certain that the core of the UOL, building bonds and fellowship between members, is possible.

During COVID we learned how to foster connections virtually and the UOL should build upon that. With technology we can facilitate meetings virtually, but perhaps more importantly to foster fellowship virtually. For our Members at Large – can we develop a Fellowship Chapter – where the members can gather together virtually. It can be a meeting or a fellowship gathering to develop connections between members of the UOC of USA. As the lay organization of the UOC we can promote connections and develop bonds across the country. This year at the UOL Convention we had several members from our Philadelphia UOL Chapter who attended the Convention for the first time. I enjoy attending the Convention with someone who is attending for the first time. I have always believed that the true vision of the UOL is to form connections with other faithful.

At the first meeting of the 2022-23 National Executive Board there was a lengthy discussion about how to include faithful who might have difficulty forming a chapter. I would like to emphasize, the National Executive Board is not suggesting that chapters should decrease. Instead we are suggesting that there is a strategy to build connections and fellowship in addition to the chapter structure. We have heard for over a decade that it is difficult to form a chapter within some parishes – we want to be certain that members can develop a way to connect. In fact, we think that members of parishes might want to join some of the ways that we connect between parishes across the



country.

Why is Kherson so important?

And what’s with the watermelon?

Very recently, you should have read or heard that the Ukrainian Army liberated Kherson, Ukraine. Though it has endured severe destruction, this city that was longest under Russian occupation now belongs to its rightful owner. This take back of control is a huge victory for Ukraine. This brings us closer to reclaiming Crimea. Our gain is Russia’s loss. Control of Kherson would have meant that Russia would be one step closer to having complete control of Ukraine’s access to the Black Sea. This loss, according to a Russian official, was just as big as the fall of the Soviet Union. Before we take a look at how it all unfolded, let’s take a look at what the city looked like before the invasion.

Kherson was founded by Grigory Potemkin in the late 1700’s. It was established as a fortress for the first Russian Naval Base and shipyard. It’s location at the mouth of the Dnipro River makes it a seaport and a river port. Khersonshchyna, or the Kherson oblast, is bordered by Dnipropetrovsk to the North, Zaporizhia to the East, Crimea and the Black Sea to the South, and Mykolaiv to the West. The region is home to a little over a million residents, with the city of Kherson having a quarter of that population. Though in recent years the population had declined, the city was still showing economic growth and much promise. Prior to the invasion in February, the Kherson International Airport was remodeled in order to accommodate Boeing 737s. The city also was home to 15 universities and 77 high schools. There is also a railway station with daily departures to Kyiv and Lviv. A main attraction of the area is Lake Lemuria or otherwise known as Pink Lake. The lake is literally pink because of an algae that exists and produces large amounts of beta-carotene. Not only is it pretty to look at, but it also boasts healing and therapeutic properties. With the opportunity for travel and tourism, all signs were pointing toward growth for this area in the future. Then the war started.

The city of Kherson was the first to fall into the hands of the Russian occupiers. In fact, only a week after the war started, the mayor of the city of Kherson, Igor Kolykhaev, reported that Russians had taken over the city. The rest of the area followed in the months to come. On the 26th of April, Russia appointed a new Mayor of the oblast capital, a former KGB agent, Alexander Kobets. Two days later, the newly appointed administration announced that the region will now be using the Russian Ruble instead of the Ukrainian Hryvnia. At the end of May, Russian President Vladimir Putin offered fast-track Russian citizenship to those living in Kherson. This is when we got wind of Russia’s intent of annexation. Then we saw a shift. On the 10th of July, Ukrainian civilians were strongly urged to flee the area. The first big sign of a counter-offensive. A week and a half later, the Antonivskiy bridge was severely damaged. Another strike by Ukrainians hit this key bridge, deeming it unusable. This bridge was one of two major crossing points from the right bank to the left bank thus isolating the aggressors. A month later, we started hearing of more cities in Khersonshchyna being liberated. This consistent pattern led to major advances by the Ukrainian army; about 1,200 sq. km. At the end of September, Russia announced referendums in four areas. President Putin then decreed the areas of Luhansk, Donetsk, Zaporizhia, and Kherson officially annexed. The official status was only seen in the eyes of Russia. By mid-October, Russia started hinting at defeat by urging its citizens to flee the areas where, as you may remember, they brought ‘peace.’ This was publicly endorsed by the Russian President on November 4th. Five days later the Russian Defense Minister, Sergei Shoigu, ordered his troops out of the area. On the 11th, Ukrainian troops were greeted warmly by Kherson residents waving Ukrainian flags.

Our victory in Kherson means a number of things. For one, Russia won’t be able to hold an advantage through access of the Dnipro. Russia also doesn’t continue to advance along the Black Sea allowing Ukraine to continue its business in agricultural exports. Another bonus, the frontline is now moving farther east and residents of Kherson get access to much needed humanitarian aid. To the residents, it’s a sign of life not death.

The beads are said to come from a plant that sprouted at the Cross during the crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ. The plant sprang from the tears of the Mother of God. A story is told that a monk struggled making a prayer rope and the Theotokos appeared to him as he was crying in desperation that he could not master the prayer rope. She placed these seeds into his hand so that he could create a prayer bracelet. The seeds of this plant naturally have an area that can be tied together.

The bracelet is beautifully packaged in an organza **purse with a brief description of this story and how to use a prayer bracelet.** All bracelets are made for adults (approximately 8 inches – with a slight variation based on the size of the seeds). As part of this strategic plan, we are proposing that for members who are within smaller parishes or not currently affiliated with a UOC parish, there is a possibility of developing the fellowship that is the true essence of the UOL. As such, we are proposing several models for developing connections. There are several models being proposed because we honestly want to think about how to build the connections between members of the UOC of USA and it will be the need that dictates which of these are successful.

The first proposal is that there are connections between areas of focus within our parish life. The UOL is unique in that we have members who are active in many areas of the church. The UOL can foster support for each of these roles within the church. Here are some examples of how this strategy could potentially work.

Choir – the goal would be to connect individuals who are interested in obtaining resources related to liturgical music. The plan would be to develop a workgroup where individuals can share resources related to choir, including music, strategies to develop a choir, recruiting members, etc.



Religious education – the plan would be to connect individuals who are interested in planning religious education within their parishes. For example, connecting individuals who are preparing Sunday School lessons or leading bible study within their parishes. Again, the goal would be to share resources, including preparation for First Confession, Sunday School, St. Nicholas programs, etc.

Parish administration – as the lay organization of the UOC the UOL is unique in its ability to connect individuals who have questions about parish administration. For example, an officer can learn from other parishes about how financial books are maintained, what strategies have worked to manage a specific challenge, etc.

Support efforts in Ukraine and Refugees - at the UOL Convention many resources were discussed about how to support Ukraine. For example, lessons learned in one parish regarding how to support mailing of supplies or helping to support individuals who recently came to the US as refugees, can be shared. The goal would be to develop a network of resources and a space to discuss and share lessons learned.

The second strategy that can be used to foster connections is one focused on phases of life, perhaps even challenges in life. The suggestion would be to have “discussion groups” or virtual meetings facilitated by a priest to address questions for each of the following groups. As Orthodox Christians the joys and challenges of life can often be a place to unite and form bonds. The idea would be to have times when we can connect and support each other. Some examples of areas for groups:

Young parents - the goal would be to develop a support system across our parishes to provide resources for young parents. This could include educational sessions with clergy that focus upon helping young parents. Sadly, in many of our parishes young parents might be the only young parents in the parish - therefore, having a support across the country could assist our young parents.

Adults caring for elderly – a challenge that many of our faithful face is caring for aging parents. At a recent UOL Convention we had a speaker who focused upon this issue. The thought would be that members of the UOC can connect virtually and develop a support system.

Senior citizens – with our increased virtual mediums – the UOL can serve as a connector for members who might feel isolated. The UOL can foster developing bonds across our UOC of USA for our seniors. This connection can include chat times as well as educational programs for our seniors.

Young adults – At the UOL Convention there was discussion about developing a Young Adult group virtually to connect and reconnect with friends from the UOL and from Teenage Conference. Organizing times to connect virtually can potentially lead to resuming our Young Adult retreats, weekends and presence at the UOL Convention.

The third possibility of fostering connections is to encourage all UOL members and UOC faithful to support existing efforts within the UOL Commission and Committee structure. The UOL has Commission areas that have existing projects that can be supported by all UOC members. We encourage members of UOL chapters, Members at Large as well as all UOC faithful to support these. For example, we hope you will consider to volunteer and support:

Education – The UOL has a strong focus on education and we hope that you consider bolstering this strong system by considering writing articles for the UOL Bulletin, judging essay contests, assisting with planning or aspects of retreats, developing a program for children at the retreats, etc.

Youth – it is the goal of every member of the UOC of USA to assist in developing youth within our parishes. Perhaps you would like to assist with the Pre-Juniors, or would consider sponsoring an event for Young Adults.

Missions and Caregiving - The UOL has several well-established mission projects. During Thanksgiving every member of the UOC can conduct a food drive and make a donation to a local food bank with the donation labeled “In 1932 10 million people perished in an artificial famine in Ukraine, we pray no one ever goes hungry again.” The UOL also supports St. Andrew Society with Souper Bowl Sunday. Each of these Mission projects can easily be sponsored across all parishes of the UOC of USA.

Vocations and Clergy Support - Members can sponsor events to support the Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund and also be the members who sponsor an event for Clergy Appreciation Day.

In addition to the structure of Fellowship and Connection is the thought that through the year – we sponsor events at similar times. We suggest that across the UOC of USA we can build a community that has a similar calendar of events. It has been amazing how the UOL Souper Bowl Sunday has bonded parishes across the US to help the St. Andrew Society. Here is a sample schedule that could be used throughout parishes where an individual member or small group can make a huge impact.

Early fall – Back to School – sponsor activity related to supporting our Sunday School Programs across the USA.

Thanksgiving Food Collection and remembrance of the Holodomor. Every parish can donate food to a local food bank and place a sticker on the donation stating: “In 1932 10 million people perished in an artificial famine in Ukraine, we pray no one ever goes hungry again.”

Participate in Pray our Way for Phillips Fast – join in our reading during the month of December where faithful read from the old testament Monday through Friday in preparation for the Nativity. As part of this reading, we also have a prayer partner for whom you pray during the Fast. Consider joining the Pray our Way.

Nativity – Carol for All Saints Camp or carol to visit parish shut-ins.

Souper Bowl Sunday – Every parish of the UOC of USA can sponsor a Souper Bowl event to support St. Andrew Society. You can prepare an elaborate event with multiple soups or simply put out a pot to collect money for St. Andrew Society. Following the event consider writing an article for the UOC and UOL webpage as well as the UOL Bulletin.

Participate in Pray our Way during Great Lent, and join in our reading the Psalms Monday through Friday in preparation for the Resurrection of our Lord. As part of this reading we also have a prayer partner for whom you pray during Great Lent. Consider joining the Pray our Way.

During Great Lent participate in a UOL Retreat. We currently have two retreats, one in Eastern Pennsylvania and one in Western Pennsylvania.

UOL Essay Contest - consider writing an essay and be sure to distribute the essay topics within your parish to encourage participation.

Clergy Appreciation Day – the UOL has designated the Sunday after Ascension and prior to Pentecost as Clergy Appreciation Day. Consider sponsoring an event or writing a card to your clergy to support the Clergy within your parish.

Attend UOL Convention and All Saints Camp for Family Fest – we have events scheduled where we can connect as a family each year. Prepare to attend the UOL Convention and Family Fest.

Are you interested in helping our efforts to support members of the UOC of USA and would you like to support our efforts to build connections across our parishes? 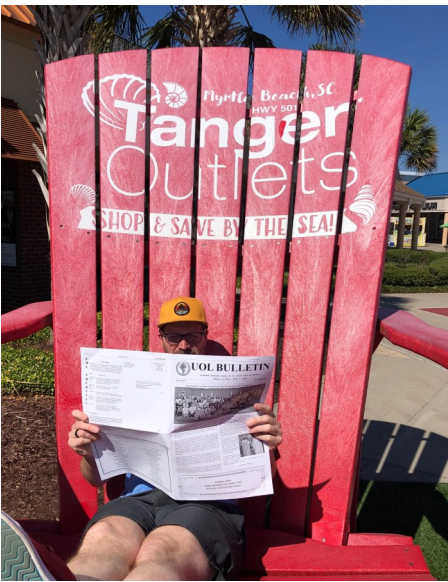
