MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR UOL

It has been three months since my husband and I took in 5 foster kids. That makes six kids total (ages 3,4,6,8,8, and 9). They come from very different upbringings. Most of them do not have a relationship with their father and their mothers have or have had serious drug addictions. Some were left at home during the night while the parent would work and some would be taken to parties so mom could do drugs. These children have seen things that I could not even think up in my wildest dreams. Every day is a challenge, for my husband and me, to provide a positive memory to replace a bad one. To them, this does not make any sense, of course. Day after day, they question why we do things for them. The oldest was shocked when I told her she should not be potty training her brother. They do not understand why we want to eat together as a family. They are always surprised when we go out together as well. The first week they were with us, we bought dozens of items of clothing because they came with enough clothes to last 3 full days. 'Why are you buying us toys? Those shoes are for me? Why do you keep leaving us notes in our lunches?' etc. The thing they question the most is how we show our faith. By law, we cannot force any religious beliefs on them. Should they want to worship according to a different rite, we would have to respect that as foster parents. The interesting thing is, without any effort, these children show such a yearning for Christ. It took them a few meals to learn the prayer we say before meals. During evening prayers, they all stand respectfully facing our icon corner and even try to make the sign of the cross as best as they can. Every now and then, we catch the younger ones playing church in the basement. The 4-year-old is my husband, Fr. John, and the 3-year-old is the other 'church man' (whom everyone else knows as Deacon Evan O'Neil). Better yet, amid our busy schedule we receive honest questions about God and our faith: 'Who is Jesus? Can we be baptized? Why can't I have communion?'

At the UOL Convention this past summer, the kids had an opportunity to spend time with the Myrrh streaming icon from St. George's in Taylor, PA. What I would have done to be a fly on the wall. Fr. Mark Leasure, the caretaker of the icon, gave each child an icon card and a piece of cotton with the oil from the Kardiotissa. These icon cards remained bedside until we had to leave. And the very first thing the kids did when they got home, was ask for tape so they can put the icon cards on the wall in their rooms.

At this point, we do not know what waits for these children. We have a court date scheduled in a month. They might get to go home or they might be moved to a family member's home. Time will tell...or the judge will decide. But one thing I am sure of is that a seed has been sown.

That is the essence of the UOL, for me. The UOL takes every project or ministry and sows a seed. The retreats sow spiritual seeds, our mission work sows seeds of comfort, our support of the seminary sows seeds of faith. We may never see these seeds sprout and we may not see how they may bear fruit. But one thing is for sure: they have been sown.

I often reflect on how our foster kids (especially the older ones) yearn to know Christ. And this is happening with little effort on my part. It makes me wonder, what would become of them if my efforts were extraordinary? Then I think about the UOL and I wonder what we could do if our efforts were extraordinary. How about we try?



In 1975, at the 28th Annual UOL Convention, The Lynn Sawchuk-Sharon Kuzbyt Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of these two dynamic young women. Their untimely deaths left an indelible mark on their families and the Ukrainian Orthodox League. Both young ladies were active in their parishes and the Jr. UOL, serving as presidents of their local chapters. They were also convention delegates and attended the camping programs.

The LSSK scholarship is awarded annually to Jr. UOL members or former members who are enrolled in advanced education and have exhibited dedication to the church and UOL. Applicants should have a strong showing of leadership, community involvement, and achieved academic excellence. This year's deserving recipients are Isabella Castrillo, Olesya Korotinsky, and Natalie Swan.

Our first recipient is **Isabella Castrillo** of St. Mary's Parish in New Britain, Connecticut. She has been very active in her Jr. UOL where she served as president of her chapter for 4 years. She was the Operation Christmas Child event leader, chaired The Tag Sale, Souper Bowl Sunday, and spearheaded the collection of school supplies for Ukraine, to name a few activities. This committee focused on strategies to increase participation at the UOL Convention.

Some suggestions:

- Make the convention more inclusive, because often MAL do not come.
- Perhaps workshops for example, for choir directors or other roles in the parish.
- Get rid of antiquated business practices. Get rid of statistics. Streamline the agenda.
- Get parishes to share information.
- Encourage more people to come.
- Dream: get 500 people to come to a convention or do a cruise convention.

What is the difference between the New and Old Calendar? What is the difference between the Gregorian and Julian Calendar?

In recent news there has been much discussion about the Julian (the Old) and Gregorian calendar (the New). The two calendars do not have separate days for our feast days – it is simply the translation between the two calendars that results in our celebrating feast days on different days.

The US and almost all of the world currently uses the Gregorian calendar. Many Orthodox churches continue to use the Julian calendar (the Old calendar). So, if using the Julian calendar in the US – we translate Christmas (December 25th) on the Julian calendar (which includes the number of days that the calendars differ) and we have January 7th. It is important to note that the calendars will continue to differ and in 2100 the date will change to January 8th (the translation from Julian to Gregorian will include an additional day).

It is also important to note that the world transitioned to the Gregorian calendar in stages. The Julian Calendar was promulgated by Julius Caesar through an edict that took effect on January 1, 46 BC. The Gregorian calendar was introduced in 1582 by Pope Gregory XIII. Since that time some countries have used the Gregorian calendar and some have used the Julian.

For centuries dates would note OS or NS (old style- Julian or new style – Gregorian). Some countries did not change to the Gregorian calendar until the 20th century. Ukraine and Russia as countries used the Julian calendar as their civil calendar until 1918 when the Soviet Union changed the civil calendar to the Gregorian. Greece changed their civil calendar to the Gregorian in 1923.

Many Orthodox churches remained using the Julian calendar which resulted in the celebration of December 25th on January 7th (translations between the two calendars). The Soviets did not change the date Christmas was celebrated, they changed the civil calendar to the Gregorian calendar. The church remained the same with the Julian calendar. It is also important to note that the calendar impacts all feast days.

The journey to All Saints Camp begins with a beautiful drive through the rolling hills and green forests of northwestern Pennsylvania to Emlenton, PA. When you arrive, you are greeted by the upbeat Camp Director Josh Oryhon at whose hands you just know you will have a good time. You are immediately impressed with the overall upkeep of the property. The campus is immaculate, and the grounds are well-kept.

If staying in cabins is not your thing, there are several hotels within an easy ride of ASC. You can sleep in air-conditioned comfort at the hotel with all the amenities and go to campus to commune with nature and your friends during the day. Friday evening, we sat with friends on the veranda of the Dining Hall catching up with what's new at the camp, the news of the day and what's ahead for the weekend.

Thanks to the camp nurse, Pauline Witkowsky who is a tour guide extraordinaire, I got a tour of the camp on the golf cart on Saturday morning. There is a newly renovated and rebuilt amphitheater that is a real cathedral in the woods. There are tall trees shooting up toward the sky making a beautiful forest canopy for the amphitheater and the ground is covered with lush green ferns. It is a perfect spot for a wedding. The wedding dinner can be catered at the Millennium Building with dancing at the Pavilion. There are accommodations for 40 in air-conditioned comfort on the first floor of the Millennium Building for guests who don't like rustic cabin camping. And of course, there are plenty of cabins for people who like camping in the woods.

At Family Fest, there is only a schedule for meals and services. Otherwise, you do your own thing. There are trails for hiking and bicycling, a swimming pool, volleyball, basketball and tennis courts and a soccer field, and equipment for playing frisbee. I enjoyed swimming in the afternoon. The camp chef, Carol Novosel does an excellent job on the meals with plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables and snacks are provided in the dining hall. In the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA, we are blessed to have priests who are excellent cooks. Father Steve Repa made delicious chicken cacciatore for lunch on Saturday and Father John Haluszczak made pulled pork sandwiches with your choice of five different gourmet sauces for Saturday dinner.

There is ample opportunity for spirituality at the camp. There are Vespers beautifully sung before dinner on Saturday and Divine Liturgy on Sunday.

It's a good way to unplug from digital devices over the weekend, but if you simply must use your devices there is WIFI in the Dining Hall and Millennium Building. It is a thoroughly relaxing, peaceful and rejuvenating experience being in God's great creation in the forests of Pennsylvania.

My only regret was not being able to stay until the end of the weekend. I teach in college and need to prep my courses at least for some time over the weekend, so I left after Divine Liturgy and a delicious brunch on Sunday featuring Chicken Kiev created by Chef Carol. But that's the beauty of Family Fest. Stay at the camp or at a local hotel and commute to camp for meals and activities. Stay for the entire encampment or just a day or so.

You might ask how much all this costs? There is no charge. All that is requested is a free will donation. It's a beautiful way to end the summer before getting back to the workaday world.


Meet the Junior National Executive Board
